DAILY DETAIL

Day 1, 2 May Mana Pools

On arrival at Harare International Airport you will board your scheduled light aircraft into the Zambezi Valley – Mana Pools. The flight gives a wonderful aerial perspective of the habitat where you will spend the next few days and you may even have your first big game sighting from the air! Mana Pools National Park lies deep within the Zambezi Valley and is one of the least commercial but most loved National Parks in Southern Africa (amongst safari veterans). The river here is lazy and meanders slowly towards Mozambique flanked on either side by Natal Mahogany, giant Faidherbia trees and wild fig forests. Within its clear waters are not only Hippos and Crocs, but also a good population of freshwater fish including the world famous Tigerfish. A cross section of mammals come to satiate their thirst at the river's edge including great herds of Elephant, Buffalo, Eland, Waterbuck, Impala, Bushbuck and Baboons. As a result of the abundance of game, predators such as Wild Dog, Lion, Leopard and Hyena gather and you will no doubt locate some of these magnificent carnivores.

On arrival at "Vundu", the first camp, lunch will be served. Usually consisting of cold meats, a variety of salads and freshly baked breads. After a refreshing lunch break you will take a short drive to the canoe launch-spot near the confluence of the Ruckomechi and Zambezi Rivers. Here, the local guide will give a full safety briefing and cover the basic techniques of steering and controlling the Canadian-style 5.5m (18 ft.) canoes. The first afternoon of paddling is taken at a slow pace, allowing you time to become acquainted with the canoes. Arrival back at camp is around sunset. The camp will be fully prepared and you will be able to sit back and relax with sundowners and snacks – tea and coffee and hot showers are also available. A campfire is already burning and this is invariably where guests will gather to discuss the day's events and plan for the morning. In the background your support staff and resident bush cook will be busy preparing a three-course dinner for you.

Day 2: The aim today is to be on the water in time to watch the sunrise. Hot water for freshening up will be placed in raised basins outside each tent, while tea, freshly brewed coffee, muffins or homemade biscuits will already be waiting at the campfire. While you pack up your personal kit, the support staff load the canoes with all required for the day ahead. Guests need only worry about a small daypack, carrying essentials such as sun block, camera, hat and binoculars. Since this is one of the most magical times of day, you will drift along quietly and listen to the sounds of the African dawn. After a couple of hours of paddling, you can enjoy a well-earned breakfast under a grove of Acacia trees. Thereafter you will have the opportunity to set off on a walk on the floodplain and into the surrounding woodlands. Aside from the game viewing opportunities, this walk will also give you a chance to explore some of the smaller aspects of this fascinating environment; such as learning about the various tracks or spoor, to strange insects and impressive birdlife. Your guide will impart his wealth of knowledge about this miniature world that forms such an integral part of the bush, after which you will return to the canoes and head downstream to an area renowned for its huge, old Elephant bulls. With some good fortune you may catch them swimming or wading out to the grass islands, where your canoes will be able to glide quietly alongside to view these awesome giants. Their age tends to make them placid enough to take no notice of the canoes.

Around midday, the canoes are pulled up below a grove of Mahogany trees, whose dense shade provides some welcome relief from the heat of the day, and lunch is served. Freshly prepared salads, pizza or quiche, cold meats, cheese and biscuits and refreshing ice-cold drinks are on offer. Once you have enjoyed your meal, you may either take another short walk through the Mahogany forest or indulge in afternoon siesta. The late afternoon is spent drifting down to camp and revelling in the game and birding along the river's edge. The welcoming support staff will be waiting at camp which is reached by sunset. Chessa, your camp for tonight, overlooks a small channel, with a large grass plain separating it from the main Zambezi, 500 metres away. Frequently, the plain hosts Buffalo, Waterbuck, Elephant and Hippo in the evenings.

Day 3: As with the previous day, you will wake up before dawn and marvel in the beautiful sunrise whilst drifting down the Zambezi. This is an exciting day as you will enter where very few people or vehicles are able to access; the remote Mana Pools National Park's "Wilderness Area". In fact, the only road is 3 to 5 kilometres inland (the same one our support team will use).

Breakfast may be taken on the Mbera River floodplain, which comprises stunning Acacia woodland with large patches of thick "adrenaline" grass – a habitat much favoured by all the predators. Towards the end of the dry season it also hosts large groups of Elephant breeding herds. You will spend the day paddling through a maze of small channels before once again joining the main Zambezi. An extraordinary set up of tables and chairs, on one of the shallow sandbanks in the middle of the river in ankle deep water, with the whole width of the river stretching out

on either side, will be today's stunning venue for lunch. This afternoon will be you last opportunity for canoeing in this exquisite habitat. Depending on water levels and allotted time, there may be a prospect to explore Chikwenya Island on foot. This unique island is the largest on this section of the river and is host to prolific bird life as well as a broad selection of mammal species. At dusk, you will paddle into Illala and revel in the rustic luxury of the Odyssey Camp.

Day 4, 5 May

Hwange National Park

Today begins with an early morning walk, to soak up the beauty of the Zambezi before breakfast, and then a short game drive back to the airstrip, where you will board your flight to Hwange National Park. Hwange National Park, one of the most highly rated reserves in Southern Africa, is Zimbabwe's largest National park and is a haven for wildlife. The numerous waterholes attract game of great variety and in large numbers - especially in the winter months when animals gather around the waterholes to quench their thirst.

This evening you will head out on an open 4x4 vehicle and after dark, your guide will use a spotlight to locate some of the nocturnal species. You may locate predators such as Lion, Leopard, which along with African Wildcat, Serval, Honey Badger and Civet are present in good numbers. Other star mammals include African Wild Dog and Cheetah, no less than 5 species of Mongoose, Black-backed and Side-striped Jackal, Bat-eared Fox, Lesser Bushbaby, Vervet Monkey, Aardwolf, Southern Giraffe, Hippo, and Burchell's Zebra. Antelope often seen in the area include Common Duiker, Eland, Impala, Kudu, Steenbok, Waterbuck, Blue Wildebeest and the regal and highly sought after Roan and Sable antelope. Birdlife in the area is prolific with more than 400 species. Arnott's Chat and the Racket-tailed Roller frequent the teak woodlands, while the Kori Bustard, Red-eyed Bulbul and Southern Pied Babbler are typical of the drier Kalahari birds. Raptors are plentiful including Martial Eagle as well as four vulture species.

Day 5 & 6, 6 to 7 May

Hwange National Park

Here you will enjoy two full days in the beauty that is Hwange National Park with morning and afternoon game drives and optional walking safaris.

Day 7, 8 May Victoria Falls

Today you will transfer to your beautiful abode for the next couple of days, the Victoria Falls Hotel, popularly known as "the grand old lady of the falls", is a luxurious 5-Star Hotel on a World Heritage site overlooking the magnificent "Victoria Falls". The hotel lies within a tranquil leafy garden, replete with unobstructed views of the Victoria Falls Bridge and the ascending spray from the falls. A private path will lead you into the Victoria Falls rainforest, a mere ten minute walk along the path. "The Smoke that Thunders", accurately describes the rising shining spray and foaming waters that roar deafeningly as the river hurls itself 103m down the falls.

This afternoon will be spent at leisure or if time permits you may board a tranquil sunset cruise on the Zambezi replete with canapés and sundowners to toast your days spent in the African bush.



David Livingstone "discovered" the falls in 1855, giving them the highest honour he could by naming them after his Queen. The continual spray from the falls has created a verdant rainforest and you will undoubtedly find some interesting birds here which may include Trumpeter and Crowned Hornbills, Bearded Scrub Robin, Yellow-breasted Apalis, various sunbirds including Amethyst, Collared and Purple-banded, Black-backed Puffback, Tropical Boubou and Red-winged Starling. The paths along the edge of the falls may produce glimpses of mammals and you should keep an eye out for shy Bushbuck, Banded Mongoose, Vervet Monkey and Baboons.

Day 8, 9 May Victoria Falls

Today you'll set off after breakfast to be mesmerised by this extraordinary phenomenon and you'll see why there is no doubt that the Falls have been given the status of one of the Seven Natural Wonders of the world! You will also have the option (at an extra cost) to embark on an exhilarating "flight of the Angels", an unforgettable helicopter flip over the falls.

Victoria Falls is also one of the meccas for purchasing traditional African art and crafts and depending on time you may have a chance to browse through the market, which offer a wide range of carvings (in both wood and stone), kitchen utensils and basket-ware.

This afternoon you may wish to partake in the sunset cruise on the Zambezi if you missed out on it the day before or perhaps just sit back with a sundowner soaking up your African experience.

Day 9, 10 May Depart

Today you will be transferred back to the Victoria Falls airport in time for your onward flight home.

Payment

In the event of a go ahead we will require a 30% deposit on confirmation and the balance to be settled 2 months prior to arrival.
